According to the Electrical Safety Foundation International, faulty wiring and other electrical hazards account for an estimated 51,000 fires each year in the U.S., nearly 500 deaths, more than 1,400 injuries, and approximately \$1.3 billion in property damage.

Loudoun County Chief Fire Marshal Linda Hale says the frequency of electrical-related fires have continued to increase in Loudoun and have caused more than \$1 million worth of damages in the last six months.

"We all use electricity in our everyday lives, but sometimes people forget the potential dangers of using electrical equipment," she says. "Oftentimes these fires are preventable, which is why our fire department is bringing attention to electrical safety."

Loudoun County Fire and NOVEC offer these tips to help eliminate electrical hazards to protect yourself, your family, and your home:

A Look for the label of an independent testing lab, such as Underwriters Laboratories, to make sure the product meets industry safety standards.

- \land Inspect electrical appliance cords for damage.
- ▲ Use power strips with internal overload protection. Or ask a licensed electrician to install additional circuits and outlets.
- A Inspect electrical plate covers: Warm or discolored covers may indicate dangerous wiring.
- A Test ground fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs) and any arc fault circuit interrupters (AFCIs).
- Use light bulbs that match the recommended wattage on the lamp or fixture. Don't use a high-watt light bulb in a lower-watt fixture. Keep hot bulbs away from anything flammable

CALL 811 BEFORE YOU DIG!

With spring in full bloom, you may be planning to plant new trees or shrubs in your yard. Planting a shade tree on the southern or western side of your house will help block the sun's heat and therefore help you save energy dollars and be more comfortable.

Before you grab a shovel, call 811 — also known as Miss Utility — at least 48 hours before you dig. It's the law. The same law applies for major construction projects, including decks, patios, and fences.

Your call will be routed to a local One Call Center. Tell the operator where you're planning to dig and what type of work you'll be doing. The center will notify the utility companies that serve you, including NOVEC, and your natural gas, phone, fiber-optic, cable, water, and sewer providers. These companies will send locators to your property to mark underground lines, pipes, and cables. Afterward, you will know their approximate location and can start shoveling. Be sure to dig at least five feet from the mark, to stay away from utility easements.
